RABBI'S MESSAGE RABBI JONATHAN L. HECHT, Ph.D. Report from the

URJ Bienniel

In December, thirty members of our Temple attended the Biennial convention of the Union for Reform Judaism in Washington, DC. That made us one of the largest groups at the Biennial and was 10 times the amount of people we had ever sent before!

We joined with 6000 Reform Jewish leaders from North America and around the world and listened to inspirational addresses from many speakers including President Barak Obama; Representative Eric Cantor, the House Majority Leader; Ehud Barak, Israel's Defense Minister; Natan Sharansky, head of the Jewish Agency for Israel; psychologist Wendy Mogul; Ambassador Nancy Brinker, sister of Susan G. Komen; and the outgoing and incoming Presidents of the URJ, Rabbis Eric Yoffie and Rick Jacobs.

Rabbi Jacobs challenged us to redefine synagogue life in North America. Too long we have viewed the synagogue as if it were a gas station. We drive up to the door, stop, let our kids out of the car so they can get filled up, and then pick them up and bring them home. By doing this for 5 years (3rd through 7th grades) we hope they will have enough Jewish "fuel" to last them their whole lives. Will this really work in the long run, Rabbi Jacobs asked? At the Biennial, a major initiative to turn this around was announced: the launch of the Campaign for Youth Engagement.

At Temple Chaverim we are already working hard to change the "gas station" metaphor: MATCH programs, Tuesday Night Torah Lishma, Jewish Meditation, TANS social action programs, Shabbat Dinners, Guitar, Family and regular Shabbat Worship services all help us refuel ourselves and not just our children!

We can do even more! Rabbi Jacobs, in his presidential address, "At the End of Two Years," challenged us to discard the "service station" approach to synagogue life completely. He suggested that we change the mindset, challenging us to re-imagine our synagogues as places where we "do service" and not places where we "get serviced." To paraphrase his words, he said: ask not "what we get from our Temple membership," but rather ask "what can we do for the Jewish people."

Let us join together to make Temple Chaverim into a community of significance; a place where deep and meaningful relationships are

fostered and the wisdom of Judaism is applied to solve the critical questions of the day. (I encourage you to view Rabbi Jacobs' Presidential address. Go to http://blogs.rj.org/ and search for his speech, "At the End of Two Years.")

What does "Reform" mean?

There are few words in our collective vocabulary that are as misunderstood and misused as 'Reform Judaism.' Depending on where you are and whom you are speaking to, it can take on a meaning ranging from apologetic, diminutive, lazy or apathetic to defiant, grand, active or caring. I would urge everyone to consider a few important factors when using the term 'Reform.' Reform is not a term that should ever bestow a quality or quantity. When I tell people that I am a Reform Jew, I am very quick to use the opportunity to educate and to explain that Reform has nothing to do with how religious I am. After all, I am your cantor, and I consider myself able to pray in any congregation and community that will accept me. But because I have chosen to pray as a Reform Jew, that means I have chosen to lend my voice to the largest affiliated Jewish movement in the world. In my mind, I am nothing more and nothing less than Jewish. Furthermore, I consider myself more globally connected and aware.



Our congregation is one of 881 Reform congregations which are connected through the Union for Reform Judaism, formerly the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. Because we are a part of this historic movement, we are committed to being partners with God in both the creation and constant improvement of our world. That means that we are accepting of ideas that are more progressive and more open to all people, regardless of sex, age, orientation or birth origin. We encourage all people to learn more about their history by fully participating in our present. We also strive to understand and be tolerant of people who do not think or feel the same way we do. Therefore, we fully embrace the idea that we are Reform -- minus the 'ed' -- and are not firmly fixed in our ways. We are a part of a process.

Being a Reform Jew gives me a strong political voice, and, to be clear, our lobbying and advocacy voice in the United States political system is the third largest lobbying group, behind the AARP and the NFIB. We are currently louder than the NRA, and we have the power to change the way America votes. Perhaps that is why it is important to be involved as much as possible, so as not to misuse or forsake this responsibility and power.

The next time someone puts you down, or considers you 'less of a Jew' because you are a Reform Jew, please be gentle when you tell them all you have learned in this article. In many ways, we are continuing to make Judaism very real and accessible for future generations because we are affiliated and connected and refuse to settle for one perspective.

At the end of January, I am packing up a suitcase and traveling to Guadalajara, Mexico. George Washington and the First Jews of America

General Washington's financial advisor and assistant was a Jewish man by the name of Chaim Solomon. During the cold winter in Valley Forge when the American soldiers were freezing and running out of food, it was Chaim Solomon who marshalled all the Jews in America and Europe to provide money in relief aid to these stranded American troops and turned the course of history. Without this help, our army would have perished before it could have defeated the British.

If you take a one-dollar bill out of your pocket, look at the eagle on the back. Notice that the stars above the eagle's head are in the shape of a six point Star of David, placed there to honor the Jews. If you turn the eagle upside down you will see a configuration that looks like a menorah...both are there at the insistence of George Washington who said we should never forget the Jewish people and what they have done in the interest of America. It is reported that Chaim Solomon died penniless having used all of his resources to aid the newly formed and poorly supplied American army.

I hope that our fifth graders and all of us are proud of the important role Jews have played in American history. As we honor George Washington we must remember that the Jewish people continue to be vital in the shaping of America.

This class will explore films from Israel. All the films have English subtitles. The first session will introduce and explore a little bit about the history of Israeli Films After that, different films will be shown and discussed. A Hebrew Lesson, a documentary film which follows the lives of five different immigrants to Israel and the struggles they face in and out of the classroom to learn Hebrew and adapt to Israeli life.
