RABBI'S MESSAGE

SUMMER'S HERE AND THE TIME IS RIGHT TO EXPLORE JEWISH CULTURE

It's summer! Why not take advantage of some of these great exhibits not too far from home. **The Jewish Museum** (1109 5th Avenue, corner 92nd Street), contains one the largest collections of Jewish culture in the world. This summer there is an exhibit on the French artist, Edouard Vuillard. The Natanson brothers, sons of prosperous Polish-French Jewish bankers, invited Vuillard to exhibit his art in the offices



of their political magazine, La Revue Blanche. They gave Vuillard his first big break. Later, Vuillard joined up with the Bernheim-Jeune gallery managed by Jos Hessel, whose gorgeous wife, Lucy, entered into a four decade long artistic and personal relationship with him. Among Vuillard's paintings are portraits of the Jewish art dealer Sam

Salz, banker David David-Weill, chairman of the family investment bank Lazard Freres, and art collectors Henri and Marcel Kapferer. Among the paintings, two family portraits, one of Madame Jean Bloch and her children and the other, of Claude Bernhein de Villers, stand out. A number of the people portrayed in these paintings perished in Auschwitz.

The Center for Jewish History (15 West 16th Street) is home to five partner organizations: The American Jewish Historical Society, the oldest national ethnic historical organization in the United States, the American Sephardi Federation, Leo Baeck Institute, Yeshiva University Museum and YIVO Institute for Jewish Research. There

are eight exhibits on view. The best one is the Yeshiva University Museum exhibit Trail of the Magic Bullet: The Jewish Encounter with Modern Medicine, 1860-1960. It is only on view through August 12, so don't miss it. It tells the story of how modern medicine emerged in the second half of the 19th century and the role that Jews played in developing innovative medical technologies and new theories of disease. For Jews, the field of scientific medicine presented new opportunities, new challenges, and new ways



to engage with modernity. Did you know that Jews comprised 50% of the physicians in Berlin, 60% in Vienna and 70% in Warsaw at the beginning of the 20th Century? Did you know that a Jewish doctor, Paul Erlich, is considered the father of chemotherapy and coined the phrase "magic bullet"? This exhibit contains medical instruments, artifacts, documents, letters, photographs, and video. I also enjoyed New York Places/Jewish Spaces: Life in the City, 1700-2012, on view through August 31 at the Center for Jewish History, which describes the identity of New York Jews by exploring the spaces we have created.



Continue downtown to the **Museum of Jewish Heritage** (36 Battery Place). There are three Special Exhibitions: Emma Lazarus: Poet of Exiles. Lazarus is famous for the "The Great Colossus" the poem engraved on the Statue of Liberty; Filming

the Camps: From Hollywood to Nuremberg is incredible, but not for children; and, Let My People Go! The Soviet Jewry Movement, 1967-1989 (on view through August 5). Don't miss the Core collection which tells the story of modern Jewish life from the century before the Holocaust to Jewish renewal after the war.

Why not take a short road trip to Philadelphia? The **National Museum** of Jewish History opened there just two years ago. It tells the story of the 350 years of Jewish life in America. The Only in America® Gallery/Hall of Fame celebrates the lives and achievements of Jewish Americans who exemplify how America has given us extraordinary opportunities. There is a special exhibition entitled To Bigotry No Sanction: George Washington & Religious Freedom. On display is George Washington's historic letter to the Hebrew Congregation in

Newport, Rhode Island. Written in August 1790, and exhibited here for the first time in a decade, it represents a courageous statement by America's first President, which underscored the new nation's pursuit of religious liberty for people of all faiths. In this letter he affirmed his commitment to a government that "gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance."



Today, we enjoy freedom of religion, but in early America you could not assume that this would be true. Between the signing of the Declaration of Independence and the ratification of the Bill of Rights, Americans engaged in an intense debate about the nature and limits of religious liberty. It is really moving to see this exhibit and then visit the Liberty Bell a few doors down the road.

Have a great summer, and, if you get a chance to go, let me know what you think of these exhibits!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE BRUCE STEIFMAN

TO MY FELLOW MEMBERS...

So here we are -- heading into the lazy, hazy days of summer! I would like to introduce myself as Temple Chaverim's new president and tell you a little about my family and how I evolved from member to board member to president.

I am married to Jody for twenty-six years and have been living in Old Bethpage for twenty-five years with our eighteen year old daughter, Jordyn who has just finished her first year at Ohio State University. We joined Temple Chaverim in 2000, just after the building was finished. I joined Men's Club, and Jody joined Sisterhood. We started to meet our Chaverim family and before I knew it, I was the chair of the Long Range Planning Committee, while Jody had become active with Sisterhood. Not coming from a religious background, Jody, Jordyn and I felt at home with our new-found family, our community of friends.

Temple Chaverim started out as a small "hamish" synagogue with less than one hundred families, meeting in someone's living room, the Plainview JCC for Tot Shabbat and in a church for the holidays. With a dream and a powerful desire to have a place to call our 'own', we moved forward to find a location and then to build our temple on top of the hill.

You know what they say, "Build it and they will come," and come they did. That small hamish congregation grew from 100 to over 200, and then within a relatively short period of time we were a congregation of over 500 families.

WOW!! Great? Yes? No? Here was the dilemma: who were we as a congregation? What happened to that hamish feeling where everyone knew everyone? Did we lose our identity? What did we stand for and where did we want to go? How big did we want to become?

At this very point in time, we were introduced to the Alban Institute and a program that they had initiated called "Synagogue Vision and Planning." As chair of Long Range Planning, I made a commitment along with our clergy, staff and 60 congregants to engage in a



conversation that began the process of searching for a Shared Vision/ Mission Statement after viewing the tape "What Size Should We Be?" and realizing that the Temple's rapid growth had changed the dynamics and demographics of the congregation.

While at the Scheidt Seminar in Atlanta, GA this past April along with one hundred presidents-elect in attendance from all over the United States, I created a poster that depicted the Synagogue Vision and Planning process. The circles in the above illustration represent those sixty congregants who ranged from senior citizens to families with children, and people from our Hebrew High, along with clergy, staff and board members.

This diverse group of temple members was engaged in a very personal, soul-searching process of defining what Temple Chaverim meant to them. It was creative, passionate and painstaking, making sure that every word and sentence described the correct thought, feeling and idea as it was perceived. Eight months later, we had tuned and fine-tuned five statements into one comprehensive shared vision for our temple.

This Vision Statement which hangs on the walls of our synagogue, is handed out at our Friday night and Saturday morning services, resides on our website and is stated in our Connections newsletter, simply states who we are as a Reform Jewish Synagogue and defines our vision in the areas of Worship, Education and Community.

Most importantly, every committee must ask themselves, "Are we living and fulfilling the Temple's "Shared Vision?" The Vision is "ALIVE." I am humbled and grateful at being given this opportunity to serve my Chaverim community and look forward to worshipping with you.

THOUGHTS FOR OUR HIGH SCHOOL AGE CONGEGRANTS

The Community Hebrew High School Graduation service was held May 14th at Temple Chaverim. It was a very spiritual student led service and one of my favorite services of the year. I'd like to share Talia Schwartz's graduation speach with you.

As teenagers, there are few things in our life that we get to chose. Our parents make us go to school, our teachers choose what we will learn, and our grades decide our future. With Hebrew High School, it seems we've found the exception to that rule. Once the average Reform Jew becomes a bar or bat mitzvah, their parents recognize that they are an adult...A Jewish adult at least. And what power comes with this honor, you may ask? That 13 year old Jewish adult gets to decide whether or not to continue Hebrew school. After months of tutoring and lessons to prepare their Torah portion and service, many young adults see their bar or bat mitzvah as the end of their Jewish education. Luckily for me, my parents still saw me as their little middle schooler and not a Jewish adult, and decided that I would participate in Hebrew High School, and that I would like it. If this was the case in any other household of the families in front of me tonight, I can assure you that every single person in this graduating class is as thankful as I am for being brought in to this program, regardless of how forceful.

For me Hebrew High School is the only class I attend purely for the knowledge it brings. Unlike high school, there are no grades and no boundaries. You can learn about anything as long as you are willing to ask. Not only is there such a wide variety of classes, from cooking and dancing to debate class, but the staff here is truly comprised of educators, not just teachers. The only way to fail a class in Hebrew High is to fail yourself by not opening up to learn anything. There are few places that I can go and feel absolutely no pressure. Community Hebrew High School is one of those places. There is absolutely nothing like it. God said that all man was created equal, and although it may not feel that way in the complicated world of high school, it does hold true here. Each and everyone of us has been lucky enough to learn and grow together, and I will be forever grateful for the lessons and experiences that I have gained from this program. If there was one thing I could say to any child debating whether or not to join Hebrew High School, I'd say do it. If there were one thing I could say to any parent of a child debating, it would be make sure they do it. It's an experience they will never regret and it's probably a mitzvah as well.

Rabbi Bennet will be available throughout the summer on Tuesdays & Thursdays or by appointment.



What's in a Title? A lot!

You have heard the question: What's in a name? A name is an identifier, given to us at birth. Titles and degrees are different. They are things we earn. You were given your name and earned your High School degree.

Of course, most people don't stop after High School. They go to college and earn a Bachelor's degree. Some people go on to graduate school for a Master's, Medical, Law, or Dental degree.

A title usually says something about the person's training or qualifications. When someone is called Doctor, we hope that he or she has gone to an accredited Medical School. When someone is called "Rabbi" we hope that he or she has the appropriate training that goes along with that title.

What is the training that goes into becoming a rabbi? For Reform Rabbis, there is an academic degree, a Masters of Arts in Hebrew Literature, and a religious degree called Ordination. The seminary that awards these degrees is Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR).

Hebrew Union College was founded in 1875 in Cincinnati by Isaac Mayer Wise. Wise understood the need for a liberal and pluralistic seminary of higher Jewish learning that would produce rabbis who were thoroughly trained. When he arrived in the United States, there was just one ordained rabbi and many "free lancers," people who had minimal training and had not gone to any recognized seminary.

In 1950 Hebrew Union College merged with the Jewish Institute of Religion, founded by Stephen S. Wise in New York. Today there are campuses of HUC-JIR in New York, Cincinnati, Los Angeles and



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Jerusalem. HUC-JIR also trains cantors, Ph.D.s in Jewish studies, educators, Temple administrators, and archaeologists.

Sadly, in recent years there has been a reemergence of "free lancers," people who have minimal training at non-academically accredited seminaries. Some of these "seminaries" have no building, library or classes. They are run by a free lance rabbi who gives out ordination to people with very little training. Unfortunately, most Jews cannot differentiate between the fully qualified rabbis and the "free lancers." They meet a person who says that he or she is a rabbi, and they don't ask any more questions.

You should know what kind of training your rabbis and your cantor have! Rabbi Hecht was ordained at HUC-JIR in 1987. He received his Master of Arts in Hebrew Literature (MAHL) in 1986. In addition, he received a Ph.D. in Jewish History from New York University in 1993 and was awarded a Doctor of Divinity this year from HUC-JIR. Rabbi Lobel and Rabbi Bennet were ordained at HUC-JIR in 2007. They each received their MAHL degrees in 2006. Cantor Hyman received his Masters degree in Sacred Music from HUC-JIR in 1999 and was invested as a cantor there in 2000.

We are so proud that our Rabbis and Cantor are fully trained and have been recognized by, and admitted into, their professional organizations: the Central Conference of American Rabbis and the American Conference of Cantors, which provide ethical supervision and oversight over all their members.



Temple Chaverim Survey Results

In early 2012, the Long Range Planning Committee sent out a firstever congregational survey -- developed with input from several committees -- to all member households. The excellent response rate of over 60% of households -- about 2-3 times higher than most voluntary surveys -- suggests that our congregation was enthusiastic about providing candid feedback on their opinions and behaviors to help shape the future of Temple Chaverim. Thank you to the many of you who provided your input.

Results were independently analyzed by Marketing Research and Marketing Professionals and presented to the Board of Trustees in February. In the following weeks, several informational sessions with committees were held which highlighted the congregation's feelings about our strengths, as well as areas to improve or optimize.

Key learning suggests that the top reasons why households joined were Bar/Bat Mitzvah and Education followed by Religious Holidays and Practices. Interestingly, top reasons for remaining a member focused on some of the same reasons along with the Clergy and Family Feeling/Intimacy/Warmth of the Temple. Our Clergy received exceptionally high ratings on all dimensions (e.g., knowledgeable, approachable, reliable, accessible, trustworthy, etc.) in addition to being recognized as one of our major strengths.

Further, Temple Chaverim also got very high marks on Making an Impact on One's Life. Office staff also received strong scores. While the Content of Emails and Connections was well regarded, our Website and Phone System weren't. Also, many said they did not know the Board and felt they could be more accessible. Many did not know our activities, suggesting an opportunity to increase awareness and involvement. We learned that top ways to Encourage Volunteerism are to allow people to choose Topics of Personal Interest and to Personally Invite People to Participate.

Several other areas were evaluated and action plans are being developed with the relevant staff/volunteers. This survey will serve as a benchmark to measure our progress in the coming years.

Again, thank you for sharing your candid feedback. It will make a real difference in our Temple of friends!








Temple Chaverim Honors Veterans

This year for the first time, congregants of Temple Chaverim participated in the Plainview Old-Bethpage Memorial Day Parade. Rabbi Jonathan L. After the parade the group continued the festivities with a bagel breakfast in the park. 

The Early Service will be a full service, filled with music and prayer, and a story or teaching of Torah. The Late Service will be a full service, include participation by the Bar and Bat Mitzvah children of the week and their families, a Torah reading, and a Sermon. Birthday blessings and pins will be given out at both services! The Early and the Late Service will take place only the FIRST FRIDAY OF THE MONTH, the other Shabbatot will be at the regular 8:00 PM time.

Tot Shabbat is moving to Sunday Mornings and will now be called "STAY, PLAY AND PRAY," and it will be led by Rabbi Hecht, Cantor Hyman and Debbye Brandell. The first one will be Sunday, September 30, at 9:00 AM.
