



X-Men Judaism

X-Men is a comic book series about “mutants.” They look and act like ordinary people, but there is something that is different about them. They have special powers, which they have to keep hidden and under control. Of course, sometimes, they will be able to use those powers to save the world.

Imagine my surprise when I got an email from one of them! Well, not a real X-Man, rather, I heard from someone who told me he was a mutant. Right after the High Holy Days, I received this email: *“Rabbi, I feel like I am a mutant. My connection with Judaism is as a heritage, not a religion. I carry my Jewishness in my heart, the beauty of its history and its culture. But I simply cannot relate to the religious side. It alienates me, and, I think, many other people like me. I would love to be part of a community that actively welcomed me and didn’t make us mutants feel like we were outsiders.”*

I think that many American Jews feel like this man. In our country, Judaism is a mixture of both cultural and religious elements. For most liberal Jews, the emphasis is definitely on the cultural and the need to support Israel. We express our Jewishness in different ways: the things we eat, family gatherings, coming together on the High Holy Days, Passover seders, living ethically, reading Jewish books, enjoying Jewish humor or music. The Jewish community is made up of all kinds of people from all different backgrounds and lots of different levels of belief (and even non-belief).

According to the most recent survey of Jewish life in America, a significant number of Jews identified themselves as “Jewish without religion.” This is part of a trend among Americans in general; more people, when asked about their faith, identify themselves as “none.” The problem for us is that when Jews assimilate into American culture, we lose our Jewish identity very quickly, and simply blend into a non-Jewish world.



Temple Chaverim is here to help. We are a home for both X-Men Jews and religious Jews. Lots of people love coming to services because they believe everything the prayer book says. Those people are “Jews with religion.” But for those mutants among us, “Jews without religion,” Temple Chaverim is a place where you can feel welcome, too. I hope you will never feel hypocritical sitting in our sanctuary. Temple Chaverim has lots of access points. We are big enough for everyone who wants to be connected to other Jews. There are many entry points into Jewish life, and Temple Chaverim has it all: Jewish music, food, learning, community, social, social action and living.

Every X-Men character struggled to celebrate what made him or her different while remaining a part of a larger community. That same struggle continues. We are all X-Men and Women... searching for meaning in our Jewish identity while trying to make a difference in the world.

A Chanukah and Thanksgiving Celebration: It’s Thanksgivukkah!

“How about a few more latkes to go with that turkey?” Chanukah fell on Thanksgiving in 2013! How did you combine your holidays? Did you serve sweet potato latkes with your turkey? How about cranberry apple sauce?

This year, for the first time since Thanksgiving was enacted in 1863, the first day of Chanukah coincided with Turkey Day. It was a unique double holiday that will not happen exactly like this again for over 70,000 years. Although the holidays will overlap again, the first day convergence has only happened once before, in 1888. It won’t overlap in some way again until 2070, and then again in 2165, according to calculations by Jonathan Mizrahi, a quantum physicist at the Sandia National Laboratories in New Mexico. After that, the first day of Chanukah won’t coincide with Thanksgiving until the year 76,695. No matter what metric one uses, Thanksgivukkah has garnered a significant following.



Mizrahi’s mathematical analysis received over 100,000 page views online, to his utter amazement. “When I first did this, I thought it was interesting, but I did not expect anywhere near the response I got,” Mizrahi said.

Thanksgiving and Chanukah share many of the same values: dedication, peace between nations, gratitude, and family. The stories of the Maccabees and Pilgrims are natural compliments - both were being persecuted for their religious beliefs, and both celebrate overcoming a struggle and being thankful.

Temple Chaverim celebrates the dual holidays with the lighting of a special ‘Menurkey,’ pictured here. Congregants have been invited to bring in their own creative interpretation of a Thanksgivukkah menorah. President's Message — Relational Judaism

On April 25th, 2012, I was in Atlanta, Georgia for the Annual Scheidt Seminar with one hundred other temple presidents-elect from around the country. There were many inspiring moments. Rabbi Rick Jacobs, President of the URJ, presided over various aspects of the weekend, and I remember him telling us novices to "Rise above the everyday managing of the temple's affairs and to become 'Visionaries.'" Wow! How beautifully esoteric and holistically spiritually sounding that was!

One of the most inspirational talks was by Steven Gitler, temple president at Adath Emanu-El in New Jersey. He quoted from a book called *Relational Judaism: Using the Power of Relationships to Transform the Jewish Community*, by Dr. Ron Wolfson.

"(Dr. Wolfson) talks about how Jewish institutions have traditionally been programmatic in their focus -- kind of the "build it and they will come" mentality. They work to plan events, working out every detail of the event. But what is happening more and more is that people come to programs, have a good time, but leave having made no connection to the institution in the process. We're doing great at the programmatic part, but we're falling down on the building relationships part. People come for programs but they stay for relationships. I've come to many events that I probably never would have come to on my own because I have friends here and they were coming. This really got me thinking. In order to keep having successful programs, grow the congregation and raise funds more effectively, we need to get better at the relational part.

People most often join synagogues because they are seeking connections and become a part of the community. When you ask our members why they joined, almost everyone will say it was because of how friendly and down to earth and welcoming everyone was. I want us to make sure that the same level of personal connection continues on in every contact people have with our synagogue because that's what will make people want to stay. That is what will keep our Jewish community strong."

This past High Holidays, I challenged everyone to participate and build those connections at Temple Chaverim. Let us work together. How can we help build relationships? How can we help make people feel more connected? And it isn't about email, Facebook, the Bulletin or regular mail. It is about one on one, personal, face to face, or telephone conversations. We need to talk to one another. Don't be surprised if you get a phone call from me, and you are more than welcome to call me, too! I want

to hear your ideas and thoughts.

I must say that it is the relationships that I have formed and the challenges I have faced that have forced me to grow personally in ways I never imagined.

I'm looking forward to continuing to serve my most precious synagogue, Temple Chaverim.





Sociable Seniors



More than 270 people attended the October program of Sociable Seniors where Touro College Law Professor Christopher Williamson presented the **“Eight Jewish Supreme Court Justices.”** You could hear a pin drop as he regaled everyone with stories that ranged from funny to poignant.

On **Thursday, December 5th, at 11:45 am**, join the Sociable Seniors for a journey to the Jews of the Far East. Rabbi Marvin Tokayer will captivate you with amazing stories when he presents **“Pepper, Silk and Ivory: the Exotic Jews of China, Japan and India.”** After his ordination, Rabbi Tokayer served as a United States Air Force Chaplain in Japan. Upon his discharge, he returned to Tokyo to serve for eight years as the rabbi for the Jewish community of Japan.

Based on his travel and research throughout China, Japan and India, he uncovered 2,500 years of Jewish life including literally the last of the Chinese Jews and a long lost Jewish cemetery in Nagasaki. Rabbi Tokayer researched how these countries opened their doors to Jews seeking asylum, becoming a sanctuary for thousands of Jewish refugees escaping first, the Russian Revolution, and later the Holocaust. Learn about the Jewish communities that still thrive there today.

On **March 6, 2014**, we are in for a special treat when **Alice Golembo**, presents **“Aunt Goldie,”** based on growing up as the grandniece of Golda Meir. She will share amusing stories of her aunt, with whom she briefly lived in Israel. Golda, the younger sister of Golembo’s grandmother, Shayna, was a frequent visitor to Golembo’s childhood home in Maryland during her many visits to the United States to raise funds in Israel’s early years.



Adult Education: Jewish Film Series Brightens up the New Year

Clear your afternoon on **Sunday, January 26th** and join Rabbi Hecht for two wonderful movies celebrating Jewish Film.

The festival begins at 12:30 pm with the Israeli film **Noodle** starring Mili Avital as an El Al flight attendant. She is twice widowed as a result of the ongoing Arab-Israeli wars, and has been going through the motions of living but is somehow detached from a real connection to life itself. Miri finds herself responsible for the young son of a Chinese woman who worked for her when she is suddenly deported for overstaying her work visa.



Miri, decides to help reunite the child, whom she nicknamed "Noodle"-- with his mother, now back in Beijing. She ends up helping, not just the boy and his mother, but herself in ways she could not have expected. The film won Best Supporting Actress from the Israeli Film Academy and numerous other awards at various film festivals. It is an opportunity to explore several important issues confronting Israeli life.

At 2:30 pm we continue with an American movie, **Hava Nagila**, a glorious celebration of the song and music we all know so well.

According to Rachel Saltz of the New York Times, "Hava Nagila": maybe you find it too kitschy, too clichéd, too easy a shorthand for all things Jewish. Or maybe you find it catchy and incontrovertible, a song you associate with losing yourself in a crowd, shoulder to shoulder with other revelers at a wedding. Whether it makes you squirm or dance, you're in good company and part of a larger tale, as the director Roberta Grossman and the writer Sophie Sartain show in their buoyant documentary, "Hava Nagila (The Movie)." Through the unlikely prism of this song the documentary manages to tell a complicated story of cultural adaptation while providing a fresh look at a good chunk of modern Jewish history, from poverty to plenty, from the shtetl in Ukraine to Israel to the suburbs of America, that "other promised land." Discussion will follow each film. All are welcome, and it is free, including the popcorn!

Social Action Glossary

TANS -- Tikkun Alliance of the North Shore -- a consortium of 11 synagogues and 2 Jewish Community Centers on the North Shore of Long Island; focuses on tikkun olam (repairing the world).

FECS - Federation Employment and Guidance Services, Inc. (part of Federation of Jewish Philanthropies, now **UJA (United Jewish Appeal)-Federation** of New York) -- meets the needs of the Jewish and broader community through a network of health and human services.

MOMMAS House -- a home for adolescent mothers and their babies; the young mothers continue education or vocational experience, and with guidance learn to support themselves and their children.

Birthday in a Box -- a TANS initiative that provides a birthday party for children living in the three Mommas House locations.

M'Yad L'Yad -- Long Island's Helping Hands -- makes it possible to give in a way that is personal, yet always anonymous, by matching volunteer sponsors with recipients. Sponsors might send toys, clothing, gift cards, school supplies, or other gently used or new items best suited to their recipient's and their family's needs.

HATZILU -- the Hebrew word for rescue or save -- assists people in distress; it provides the Jewish elderly and poor with food, financial aid, social work intervention and assistance, and emotional support. A volunteer network of people from synagogues, Men's Clubs, Sisterhoods, Youth Groups and other service organizations, it maintains the largest kosher food warehouse in Nassau County.

Our Own Lone Soldier, Rachel Bressner



Rachel Bressner, daughter of congregants Karen and Jon Bressner, is our very own Lone Soldier in Israel. She completed her Hebrew Ulpan course with flying colors and was formerly drafted into the IDF on November 14th as a combat soldier. She received her first choice, Electronic Warfare. She's ready to serve sporting her new uniform.

Mitzvah Maker — Amy Isaacson Klein, a Survivor and Thriver

Many members of our congregation devote their efforts to important causes in addition to their volunteer work at the Temple. We hope you will celebrate their hard work and achievement. Mostly, we hope you will find ways to support their efforts: join their walks, ride in their bike rides, play in their golf outings, and contribute to their causes.

On June 7th 2011, Amy Isaacson-Klein was diagnosed with breast cancer. She underwent a double mastectomy, five months of chemotherapy and two reconstructive surgeries, and later two more surgeries. From the beginning, she was determined to fight. Her two young children were only in kindergarten and 3rd grade; she knew they needed her. Amy, a teacher for 25 years, was astonished by all the extraordinary kindness so many people bestowed upon her and her family throughout this difficult period; however, Amy amazed everyone with her courage and tenacity.

During the past two years, her husband Rich wrote to friends periodically to let them know how Amy was doing. He said that during this time “she showed us all how she and others like her find the strength and courage to battle and fight in order to defeat this horrible disease. Through it all, she never gave up. Even on her worst days, she still did homework with the kids and all the other things only a mother and wife can do.”



Rich says, “Amy is not only a SURVIVOR but also a THRIVER! She has kicked cancer’s butt and gone back to the job she loves teaching children, resumed her “mommy duties” carpooling for various activities the kids are involved in, doing things on the weekends, and still finds the time to support those who are going through what she did a short time ago. Most importantly, she is happily enjoying life!”

Over the last two years, her team, “Amy’s Anchors” with 120 members, has participated in the Annual Making Strides Against Breast Cancer Walk at Jones Beach. She and Rich have also done Relay for Life and the Woodbury Magazine Pink Book. Together they have raised over \$50,000.00! They hope that these funds will help make advancements in the prevention and treatment of this disease. One day they want to see breast cancer eradicated once and for all!




Fundraising and Fun-Raising!

The winners will be selected January 14th at Comedy Night.





Be Strategic on December 8th

Currently, the Long Range Planning Committee is in the process of exploring how we can improve our synagogue and insure that future generations will have a place to pray, learn and celebrate.

Since our congregation's founding over 25 years ago, much has changed, both in terms of our synagogue and our community. Pressures on our families have evolved and people face many challenges, including time, finances, health issues; it seems endless what families must balance today. However, our commitment to a strong Jewish community has not wavered.

As a result, this past September, the Long Range Planning Committee began a process, including working with a consultant, to explore ways that our synagogue can better serve the needs of our members. They have reviewed some of our strengths, challenges and potentials. Last year's congregational survey results have been reviewed to learn what congregants want from their Temple. Many areas are being looked at: for instance, is the Temple Vision Statement up to date? Does it reflect and set the tone for Temple Chaverim today?

One of the most important things the committee has learned is the power of relationships. They believe this is the key to making members feel close to the synagogue, become active in Temple initiatives and, most importantly, stay life-long members, keeping the Jewish community strong for our children and grandchildren. What can we do at Temple Chaverim to build positive life-long relationships with our members?
