

Fall is here. Summer vacations are behind us. Yellow school buses are appearing on the roads, and bumper stickers remind us: "School's Open, Drive Carefully." The kids are back at college. And, Jewishly, a new year, 5776, has begun! For thousands of years, Jews have flocked to the synagogue in the fall in great numbers to reconnect.

What compels us to return, year after year? The holiday experience is intensely personal. We come as unique individuals to Temple to consider the direction our lives have taken, to ask forgiveness for our own mistakes, and to promise to change. During *Tashlich* we throw our sins, like breadcrumbs, into the ocean. At *Yizkor*, we remember our loved ones.

Yet, at the same time, these holidays are profoundly communal. In its great wisdom, Judaism insists that each person express his or her individuality in the context of the community. You need a *minyan* (a quorum of 10 Jews) to have a Jewish worship service. We might approach God as individuals, but we do it next to other Jews doing the same thing at the same time. Through community, through synagogue, through the Jewish people, we express ourselves. We don't do it alone; we do it with others. That is what compels us to come back, year after year, on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. *Mishkan haNefesh*, the new High Holy Day prayer book for the Reform Movement, is written with these goals in mind. There is something in it for each of us: soaring poetry, Jewish philosophy, feminist theology, gender sensitivity, exquisite translations, traditional Hebrew with transliterations so each of us can participate as individuals. At the same time, it unites us as a community. It is a book written for one and for all.

In the Talmud there is a book called "Ethics of the Fathers," *Pirkei Avot.* In it we are told that 10 miracles took place in the Holy Temple in Jerusalem. People didn't get sick; the offerings were never spoiled; no bugs landed on the food; the High Priest never became impure; the rain never put out the fire burning on the altar; the wind never blew the fire's smoke; the donations were always pure; the building never became overcrowded; no one was ever bitten by a snake or scorpion; and the tenth, and final miracle was this: no one ever said to his or her companion, "There is no place for me to stay in Jerusalem."

That last and final miracle still applies to our synagogue today—there is always a place for each of us. Temple Chaverim is a place for one and all. I look forward to sharing the New Year together with you.

Cantor's Corner — Sound the Shofar

In the Torah (Lev. 23), we are commanded to "sound the *shofar*," and it is deemed a mitzvah to hear it every year. What is this remarkable instrument and what are the sounds?

In ancient Temple times the *shofar* heralded the holidays, the Sabbath, or the start of a war, and eventually became part of the Levite orchestra. The honor of blowing the *shofar* is done by the *Ba'al Tekiah*, literally the Master of the Blast.

A Kosher *shofar* is created from the horn of an animal of the Bovidae family, preferably from rams, sheep, or ibex (kudu), rather than from cows. Some believe the ram's horn is most preferable because it

reminds us of Abraham's devotion, and that the ram was sacrificed instead of Isaac.

Shofar traditions vary. The Moroccan tradition produces shofarot (shofars) that are flat.



possessing only the main curve. Created during the Inquisition, it could be carried hidden when Jews were forbidden to use it. The long-curled *shofarot* from the kudu, a type of antelope more common in Yemen, are preferred by Yemenite Jews.

Over time, doubts arose as to the correct sounds to use. A system of three sounds was devised to account for all the possibilities: *Teki'ah*, which means "sticking," describes how all the notes remain constant; it is the simplest, consisting of one distinct tone but may be preceded by a very short tone. *Shevarim*, or "fraction", is the partial sounding of one note followed by two more slightly longer sounds.

Teru'ah, or "fanfare," is the most ornate, consisting of nine short blasts. Of course, everyone is waiting for the *teki'ah g'dolah*, the long, grand sounding of the *shofar*. The person blowing the *shofar* takes in a great breath to blow the *shofar* for an extended time until running out of breath, thus maximizing everyone's chance to fulfill the mitzvah.

The *shofar*, one of the oldest instruments, has the holy task -- to call our souls to attention at the turning of the year before the closing of the Gates of Repentance. We must be as attentive as possible to fulfill the mitzvah of hearing the sound of the *shofar*. I look forward to fulfilling this mitzvah with you during the High Holidays.

LIFELONG LEARNING PROGRAMS

Adult Education

This fall the Adult Education Committee is offering a number of learning opportunities; do one or do them all! On Monday evenings, beginning on October 12, Rabbi Hecht will be teaching a series of classes on Sephardic Jewish History at the Adult Institute for Jewish Learning. Sephardic Jewry originated in Spain and then spread throughout the world. Sephardic Jewry created a great cultural legacy in many areas: Jewish philosophy, kabbalah, biblical studies, halakhic studies, and poetry. The course will cover the history of Sepharad from its origins, through its Golden Age, and into its period of decline and exile in 1492.

Become an Adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah! Every few years, the Temple offers a unique opportunity for adults to become Bar or Bat Mitzvah. The first year is basic Hebrew reading, and the second year a more intense preparation. Students learn about the worship service, the Torah, and the Haftarah. The class culminates with a Friday evening worship experience. The current group of students is entering the second year, but if you know some basic Hebrew, you can still join. Call Rabbi Hecht for more details. The class begins Thursday, September 24 at 7:00 pm.

Rabbi Hecht will also be teaching the second level of iEngage (Israel Engagement). Last year, iEngage 1 explored Zionism. It was a phenomenal class: the debates and discussions, the videos from Shalom Hartman Institute, and the material the class examined were excellent. The second year of iEngage covers "The Tribes of Israel, its People & Culture." The focus will be on the many different groups or communities that make up modern Israel: Orthodox and Secular, Zionist and Nationalist, Druze, Bedouin, Israeli Arab, Non-Jewish, and Ultra Orthodox. These communities are sometimes in conflict and sometimes work together. Find out what makes Israel such a special place! Beginning on Tuesday, October 6 the class runs from 8:00-9:30 pm.

Howard launched the first and incredibly successful **Swing for Independence**, a golf outing supporting both the Compass Project of Jewish Child Care Association and the POINT Program, a comparable opportunity through Westchester Jewish Community Services.

Two hundred people attended this glorious day. This event, which took place early this summer, was so well attended that all the golf spots at the Willow Ridge Country Club in Harrison were filled, and additional golfers were accommodated at nearby Apawamis Golf Club in Rye, New York.

The event raised \$210,000 through golf, event sponsorships, journal ads and raffles. There was not a dry eye at the dinner when Compass and POINT Program participants shared how the programs help them reach their dreams.

Our Sister Synagogue in Israel: Darchei Noam

This summer I spent a Shabbat with Congregation Darchei Noam, our sister synagogue, in Ramat haSharon, Israel.

Now Darchei Noam can finally make full use of its facility, and Israelis can make tax-exempt contributions to the synagogue. (Our donations to Darchei Noam go through the World Union for Progressive Judaism and have always been fully tax deductible.)

It has taken years of hard work, lots of money, persistence and patience to get to this moment. Darchei Noam shines as a beacon of hope for people who are looking for another way to practice Judaism in Israel.

World Zionist Congress elections take place every 10 years. These elections are for representatives to the Congress whose next meeting is this October in Jerusalem.

The delegates come from Israel, the

United States and the rest of the world, with one third of the delegates from each. The Israeli representatives are chosen through the Knesset election and the United States and the world delegates through special elections. You may remember how many times we urged you to vote this past year, and now here are the results. The Reform and Reconstructionist movements, running on a joint platform, carried 40% of the votes, giving us 56 out of a possible 145 seats in the U.S. delegation! Because of our great success, we will be able to express our passion and strong commitment to egalitarianism, pluralism, and democratic values in October. Given recent events in Israel, including the fire bombings carried out by Jewish extremists against Palestinian and Christian targets and the stabbing of three people by an ultra orthodox religious zealot at the Gay Pride parade in Jerusalem in July, our victory couldn't have come at a more important time.

Thank you to all who heeded our call to vote. Our strong voice in Jerusalem in October will make a difference.
