

### **Summer Road Trips!**

It's summertime and here are my annual suggestions for Jewishthemed road trips!



Starting uptown at the Jewish Museum enjoy two exhibits. Florine Stettheimer: Painting Poetry. Stettheimer [1871-1944] "is an icon of Jazz Age New York. Born to a wealthy Jewish family in Rochester, she studied at the Art Students League in NYC and in Europe. Upon her return to the US, she hosted an elite salon attracting many of the artistic vanguard including

Alfred Stieglitz, Georgia O'Keeffe, and Marcel Duchamp. View paintings and drawings, costume and theater designs, photographs, ephemera and poetry."

Then check out Charlemagne Palestine's Bear Mitzvah in

Meshugahland, an incredible installation of hundreds of teddy bears and other plush toys influenced by this artist's Brooklyn Jewish roots." Born Chaim Moshe Tzadik Palestine to Eastern European immigrant parents, he has incorporated toys in his art for decades.



Both exhibits run until August 6. If you get hungry, stop at the onsite **Russ & Daughters Restaurant** for lunch and leave time for the museum's fantastic Judaica store. **thejewishmuseum.org** 



A bit further south at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, enjoy Irving Penn: Centennial. Penn [1917-2009], was "one of the most important and influential photographers of the 20th century. He was born in Plainfield, N.J. and had a 70 year career. His father, who emigrated from Russia in 1908 and shortly thereafter, changed his name from Chaim Michelsohn to Harry Penn, was a clockmaker and a Sunday." At the Met through July 30. metmuseum.org

Continuing south to the Museum of Arts and Design, enjoy total whimsy at the wonderful exhibit of Judith Leiber: Crafting a New York Story. Learn the story of this illustrious Holocaust survivor, "craftswoman, designer, and businesswoman. The exhibition includes handbags that encompass the history of her eponymous company, from 1963 when Leiber founded the



company at the age of forty-two, through 2004 when she designed

her last handbag. The exhibit explores the significance of the handbag in twentieth-century Western culture, and the centrality of immigrant entrepreneurship in the fabric of New York." It ends August 6. (madmuseum.org)

At the Center for Jewish History there are quite a few ex-

hibits to explore including **ZIONIS-**MUS: The German Roots of Zionism, on view until August 31. "Dreams of a refuge from anti-Semitism gained popularity in the context of 19<sup>th</sup>century discrimination against Jews. The Zionist vision was most potent



among the assimilated Jews in Vienna and Berlin. The organization and financial capacity of the early Zionist movement was rooted in German lands. WW I transformed the political landscape of Europe and the direction of the Zionist movement." cjh.org

If you are anywhere near Boston, please make time to stop at **The Museum of Fine Arts** and see **Memory Unearthed: The Lodz Ghetto Photographs of Henryk Ross**. He was



among the 160,000 Jews confined from 1940-1944 in a poor industrial section of the city. He was responsible for taking official photographs for Jewish identification cards, as well as images used as propaganda photos for the Nazis that promoted the ghet-

to's efficiency. At great personal risk, he also photographed, with the help of his wife, life inside the Lodz Ghetto, including the brutal realities of life under the Nazis. When the Lodz Ghetto deportations began, he buried 6,000 negatives hoping to leave behind a record of the tragedy. More than half the negatives survived and so did Ross and his wife, enabling them to dig up their buried treasure. On view until July 30. **mfa.org**

Our synagogue is the place to get involved. It will make you feel great, and it will set an important example for your children. I am pictured here with two of our devoted volunteers. They are



brief words welcome, followed by a niggun, the Hebrew word for 'playing' an instrument which produces a 'melody' or niggun. Quite often this melody is wordless, but is sung on rhythmically repeating syllables, such as 'lai-lai-lai' or 'ya-ba-ba.'



What are the origins of this tradition, and how do we use them effectively in our sanctuary? According to ethnomusicologist Judah Cohen, *niggunim*, [the plural], were first notated in Western notation by Salamone Rossi (1570-1630) as a product of chochmat hanigun v'hamusikah or "the knowledge of a niggun and of music." Therefore, in addition to what is known as a wordless melody, a *niggun* can also be understood to be a skillful composition. A proper niggun should build -- starting quietly or simply, moving upwards in volume and intensity, and finally returning to the simple or quiet.

The most prolific use of the *niggun* is conducted by the Chassidic communities of Modzitz and Ger, who use the niggun as a means to achieve oneness or unity by singing the melodies over and over again. For the Chassidim, the use of melody rivals that of words because a melody represents potential if sung with the right intention. The Kabbalists also recognized the power of the niggun as a means for unlocking the sefirot or circles which help us access the Ineffable or God.

The modern, liberal Jewish communities, such as at Temple Chaverim, have re-envisioned this as a chance to transition from one space to another, both physically and spiritually, so that God's essence can be accessed or understood in layers or levels which are revealed in the process of joining in singing a *niggun*.

Every person who enters our sanctuary carries the weight of the week with him or her in some form or another. Some also carry the added anxieties of travel, family and perhaps anticipation of what is taking place on the upcoming Saturday's Bar or Bat Mitzvah. A niggun at this moment becomes a great equalizer. No previous knowledge or skill with music is required. Everyone is invited and encouraged to participate in singing; and through this singing, we build a united community of worshippers.

I hope that each of you will sing, and sing loudly each Shabbat, but especially when we begin our worship with a niggun.



#### **Ask Dear Yenta**

Dear Yenta,

I am curious why the Temple is always asking for volunteers? I know the staff includes clergy, administrative and custodial personnel. Why do they still need volunteers? What am I missing?

Dear Curious.

What a great question! Yes, our synagogue does have a variety of staff, but we still need volunteers! Our congregation includes approximately 475 families, which equates to nearly 900 adults and 800 children.

The clergy and staff provide a wide-range of services to all our members. They lead Shabbat Services every week in addition to holiday services and various life-cycle events, such as funerals, weddings and baby namings; in addition they work with all of our Religious School students, starting with our very youngest at PJs and Prayer, every Bar & Bat Mitzvah child, and our high school kids. They manage the building, set up, clean up and repair. They keep the office running and answer our questions. We do not have the space to list all the things they do!

But, even with them working full steam, there are many things that still need to get done. That is where volunteers come in. Scan through this edition of *Connections* and you will see that volunteers are critical to making many of the "extras" at our synagogue happen. They plan the Women's Seder, Game Night and so many other events. They organize Potluck Shabbat Dinners, programs for our senior citizens, family bingo and fun fundraising events. Without them, none of this could happen. It's all planned and staffed by Temple volunteers.

Our Board of Directors are all volunteers. Many have full-time jobs and families to care for, but they make the time to provide the oversight and governance of our Temple. The list of things that volunteers do at Temple is quite long, but the important message here is that our Temple's volunteers invest their time and effort to make sure that our synagogue can provide more than what would be humanly possible by the paid staff alone.

There are all kinds volunteer opportunities at the Temple; some require lots of time and commitment, some take just a little. The best thing about volunteering at the Temple is that it's not just about what you give, it's also about what you get out of doing it. The ROI—return on investment—is huge! You will be sustaining a vibrant Jewish synagogue in our community. You will demonstrate to others what your values and vision of our world are. Volunteering is an odd thing: we start thinking we are the givers, but in the end, we become the beneficiaries.

#### **Community Action Volunteer Opportunities!**

Thank you to everyone who made our **Prom Dress Collection** a great success. We collected nearly 200 gorgeous gowns and fancy dresses! If you missed this year, don't worry; we will be collecting again next year!

This summer there are several initiatives our congregation is supporting.

First, there is the 16th Annual Long Island North Shore Supplies for

**Success**. This program ensures that kids living in poverty will start school with the supplies they need, and their caregivers will not have to choose between food and school supplies. Last year, more than 6,000 backpacks were distributed on Long Island.

From now until Monday, August 14 we will be collecting new school supplies for distribution by the United Jewish Appeal (UJA). Please donate backpacks, binders, pens, pencils,

spiral and marble notebooks, highlighters, scissors, protractors, markers, calculators, rulers, glue sticks and crayons. You can drop off everything at the Temple in the school wing.

When you go shopping for your children's supplies, just double the list you get from their teachers. Or you can go to the UJA website, www.ujafedny.org/schoolsupplydonations,

and make an \$18 donation that will provide a child with a new backpack filled with school supplies.

Anyone at least 12 years old, can help set up for **Backpack Packing Days** on either **Tuesday**, **August 15 or Wednesday**, **August 16**, at Schechter School of Long Island in Williston Park. There are two shifts each day.




