All Rivers Run to the Sea... Remembering Elie Wiesel

Rabbi Jonathan Hecht, Ph.D.

While I was studying this summer at the Shalom Hartman Institute in Jerusalem a Jewish giant passed away. Elie Wiesel died on July 2. His life story touched so many people. He was a survivor whose novel, *Night*, gave the world a way to remember and to learn what happened during the Holocaust.

Wiesel wrote over 40 books. My favorite one is not *Night*. It is *All Rivers Run to the Sea*. While *Night* is semi-fictional, *All Rivers* is a true biographical memoir of what actually took place in Wiesel's life before, during, and after the Holocaust. He describes his early years, his family, what happened to them, and how he reconstructed his life, becoming a journalist, Zionist and husband after the war.

The title of this book was taken from the biblical verse, "All rivers flow into the sea, yet the sea is never full..." (Ecclesiastes 1:7). By choosing this title, Wiesel was saying that his life story was just one of many from the Holocaust. Each individual's Holocaust story flows like a river towards the sea but the sea itself never gets full because there are so many more to tell.

What made Wiesel special wasn't the uniqueness of his tale, but the way he told it. He spoke, not from anger, rage, or hatred, but calmly, thoughtfully, and compellingly. He told the story of inhumanity in order to remove it from the world.

Hatred and zeal, Wiesel taught, remove God's presence from the world.

Looking around today we see that the "sea is never full." There is a rising tide of bitterness and anger that, left unchecked, can overwhelm us. Today, in our own country, we see the flood waters of intolerance rising against those who look different, speak differently, come from different places or believe differently.

It is now up to us to keep Wiesel's message alive! We can speak out, write our elected officials, vote, volunteer, and show, through our actions, what our values are. Wiesel's message was clear and consistent: We cannot afford to look the other way. It is not enough to simply say "we care". Our actions will speak louder.

Dear Friends,

Let's continue his good work. There are many problems in this world, but Judaism gives us a path to make things better. Let's take the High Holiday messages from the prayers, the sermons, and the music and put them to good use. Think about Elie Wiesel's plea not to be indifferent.

Then, join me at the Temple. Of course, we have services, and I would love to see you there, but there are many ways for each of us to care, to join in and support our various initiatives, including food drives, clothing collections, and fundraising. Too many things to list here, but with a few hours or more of your time, you can make a difference. That is a powerful message.

Cantor's Corner—High Holy Day Music



The music for the High Holy Days is intentionally set apart from many pieces composed for regular Shabbat consumption. There are a few pieces that cross over into our year-round repertoire; but because of the need for music which matches the time sensitive holiday liturgy, we are eager to hear the specialness and uniqueness of High Holy Day music.

Of all the pieces written for the High Holy Days, perhaps it is Max Janowski's **Avinu Malkeinu** that is best known within the Reform practice. This is the melody that comes to mind when many people think about the wonderment of the High Holy Days. The piece was written for solo voice, choir and organ and has been recorded by many of the great cantors as well as secular singers.

The dialogue between God and creation through music is one of Janowski's strongest features. Through his use of word painting, it is apparent how there are different effective ways of speaking to God. The music itself allows us to petition to God with our whole being; and hopefully God listens. With the beginning solo entrance, a conversation evolves between cantor and God. The music at this point has a spiral effect through the use of triplets. This effect is continued throughout much of the piece and is deliberate, as its effect continues to wind the listeners ever upward.

Janowski has an ascending musical line when he mentions God, and brings the music descending back down when the text mentions whatever we are petitioning from God. The use of proper dynamics also helps paint this image that we are still small when we attempt to approach God. We begin with piano -- "hear our voice" -- and by the end of the piece, we repeat this petition with full voice and full intent. There is also a sense of urgency at the moment when we ask to be "inscribed in the Book of Life," through the use of modulation and the fact that everyone is singing. No one is exempt from the responsibility of asking God for guidance.

Janowski clearly wrote the music with the Reform prayer book in mind, and specifically the text found in the 1967 **Union Prayer Book**. Because of the popularity of this music and to respect the powerful folk appeal, moving forward, the text found in the two *machzurim*, High Holy Day prayer books, **Gates of Repentance** (1978) and the newest **Mishkan HaNefesh** (2015), has not been altered. This holiday season, when we approach the Ark with this plea for favorable judgment from God, I hope each of us will see these words and hear this music with a great deal of awe, majesty and, of course, new-found respect for the power of its modern appeal.

Religious School — Our Updated Curriculum Rocks!

What will a graduate of the Temple Chaverim Religious School know? Plenty! Over the past year dedicated congregants, experienced Jewish educators and myself have updated our Religious School curriculum.

Our course of study builds on a child's progressive capacity to learn, question and engage with their world. Beginning with kindergarten, each grade has tasks to accomplish.

We want our students to be able to answer important questions related to their Judaism and their Jewish identity in order to find their place in the world of Jewish life. The easiest way for me to present our curriculum is in the form of questions.

Kindergarten, Grades 1 & 2 -

What makes me Jewish? What is important about Shabbat and each of our Jewish holidays?

Grade 3 - What is the Jewish people's relationship to the Torah? How is Torah relevant to my life today? How can we infuse days, weeks and years with meaning and connection? What is the main idea of each Jewish holiday? Why is it important to learn Hebrew?



Grade 4 - How do the Prophets serve as role models for us today? How are the Jewish people connected to Israel? How does Hebrew connect me to the holidays, the Jewish people and Israel? How does learning all the letters and vowels help me become a better Hebrew reader?



Grade 5 - What are the different ways to celebrate being Jewish throughout our lives? How do lifecycle events connect us to God, to our traditions and history? How does the freedom that we discuss during Passover relate to the ongoing history of the Jewish people? How does knowing Hebrew help us to better understand prayer and Jewish rituals?

Grade 6 - How can Jewish values guide my life and decision-making? What enabled the Jewish people to survive and succeed throughout history? How do *tefillot* (prayers) connect us to God and our community?



Grade 7 - What role does Judaism play in my life today and what would I like it to be in the future? How do the values and rituals support and help me reach my potential as I

prepare for the transitions ahead? How do the lessons learned from the Holocaust relate to my understanding of what it means to act ethically?



Jewish art, music and cooking enrich my connection to Jewish life and living? How do I connect to the Jewish world through my acts of *tzedakah*?

Grade 10 - What does Judaism mean to me? How do I make decisions informed by my Jewish values? Who am I as an individual and where do I fit in the larger Jewish community? What is a core value that I believe in which helps guide me in my life?



Grades 11 & 12 - How does my Judaism encourage me to connect to my best self? In what ways do I contribute to the Jewish world? How can I support Israel even if I disagree with some of Israel's policies? How does Judaism shape the way I engage in deeds of compassion? What tools do I need to assist me in engaging in Jewish life on campus? How do I continue to be a leader in college?



Religious School begins the week of September 11.

I look forward to spending the coming year continuing to learn and grow with the students of Temple Chaverim.

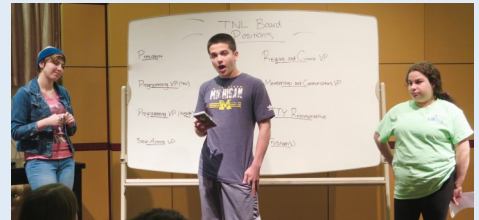

Our Sister Congregation in Israel: Darchei Noam

This summer Gladys and I visited our sister congregation Darchei Noam in Ramat haSharon, a suburb of Tel Aviv. Those of you who are new to Temple Chaverim may not know that we have built a very special connection to this synagogue over many years.

Darchei Noam is one of a handful of Reform Synagogues in Israel and a member of the Israel Movement for Progressive Judaism (IMPJ). Orthodox synagogues in Israel receive funding from the government, and, because of the participation of Orthodox Jewish parties in the government, Reform and Conservative Synagogues struggle to build and sustain themselves.

We have visited Darchei Noam on each of our temple trips to Israel, and we will be there once again during our congregation's trip in July 2017. We have gotten to know Darchei Noam's members and have helped the congregation grow. The first time we visited Darchei Noam, it was just a shell of a building surrounded by mud. Now it is a stunning modern facility. Today, through innovative worship and programs, Darchei Noam shows Israelis that there is more than one way to be Jewish!



During our visit this summer, two boys who were becoming Bar Mitzvah put on Tefillin with the aid of Rabbi Eli Levin, an Israeli graduate of Hebrew Union College in Jerusalem.



Later, at the Shabbat service, they led the congregation in several prayers and the Motzi, the prayer before eating the challah, during the Oneg Shabbat. As I watched them and their parents, I saw the same glow of pride on their faces that I see each week here at Temple Chaverim!

Sadly, Ilana Dothan, Darchei Noam's President, was not present. Happily, she was in the US, celebrating in Buffalo, NY, the birth of her daughter's first child, giving Ilana her newest and greatest title yet: *Savta*, grandmother!

Darchei Noam's future is very important to us. It has taken vision, years of determination, and money, to get to this moment. Visiting Beit Ruth Educational Village in Israel

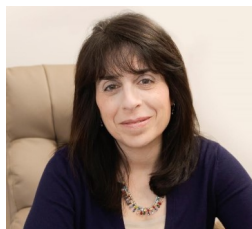

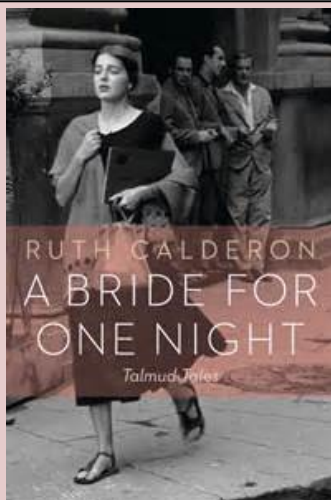

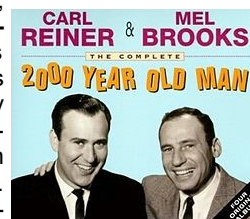

Ashkenazic Jewry History with Rabbi Hecht

Rabbi Hecht will teach a series of seven classes on Ashkenazic Jewish history at the **Adult Institute for Jewish Learning** beginning **Monday evening, November 7 from 7:45 to 8:45 pm**.

The course starts with the beginning of the 10th century when Northern Europe experienced a rapid revitalization that continued for a number of centuries.

Discussion will focus on the Jewish community that was created and the various forces that led to its emergence as the foundation for much of modern Jewry.



Among the topics to be covered are the causes of the Crusades and how they affected the Jewish community, the economic activities open to Jews and where the idea of "Shylock" (the Jewish money lender) came from, and an examination of some of the great figures of Ashkenazic Jewry.

Dear Big Heart,

Your big heart is to be commended. For me, Your Yenta, I always start with **Jewish charities**. Other charities have many people to support them, whereas, our Jewish charities count on the generosity of the Jewish people. It is not to say that only Jewish people donate to Jewish charities, because that is not true; and it is important to support a range of causes. However, supporting Jewish charities has additional benefits.

The Jewish community is small comparative to the rest of the world. The world's core Jewish population in early 2014 was estimated at 14.2 million people (around 0.2% of the world's population) of the 7.2 billion people in the world.

First, decide how much you feel comfortable giving. Then choose a few general causes that are especially meaningful to you. Right here at Temple Chaverim, we have numerous funds that you can donate to that have a great impact on our synagogue.

There are also Jewish charities that support major initiatives around the world. Why give to them? It ensures that the Jewish people get recognized instead of grouped in with everyone else. For instance, are you concerned about world poverty and Human Rights? Then consider giving to the American World Jewish Service, AWJS, which has distributed over \$270 million to promote human rights in the developing world.

Giving to Israel is vital, especially in today's anti-Israel environment. There are a wide variety of charities in Israel to support just about any topic you can think of.

If you would like some ideas, please call Rabbi Hecht and he will be happy to suggest Jewish charities that match your goals. Happy giving!

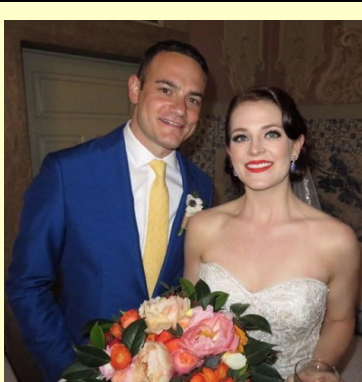

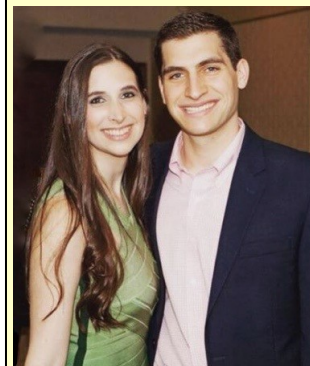

For reasons unknown, military veterans are twice as likely to develop ALS as the general population. There is no cure and only one FDA approved drug, which modestly extends survival. However, with your help, the ALS Association works tirelessly to fulfill its mission to create a world without ALS.

Gail has a team, **Memories of Miriam**, participating in the **NY Walk to Defeat ALS on September 17 at 10 am in Eisenhower Park**. Remember all those Ice Bucket Challenges for ALS? They were very successful and raised an enormous amount of awareness and money for ALS research.

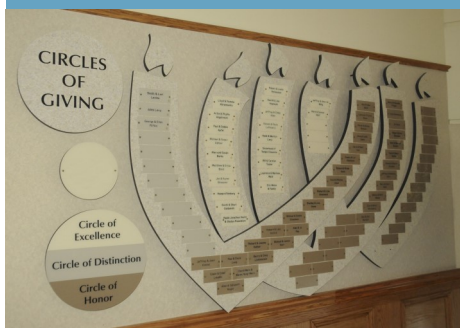

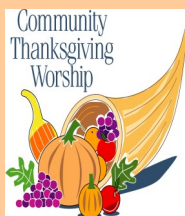
