President's Message



I am proud to wish Temple Chaverim, Mazel Tov! Sure, there are so many reasons to be happy about being part of Temple Chaverim. However, today I say congratulations for being members of a strong and wellrespected Jewish Congregation. Why NOW do I

congratulate you? Because NOW, more than ever, being a member of Temple Chaverim gives you something that many other Jews in our world don't have: affiliation to a vibrant, robust and STRONG Jewish family and institution to rely on.

The recent "National Day of Hate" organized by neo-Nazi and white supremacy groups heavily reported on in the news— proved to be much of a non-event. Why, because Jewish organizations of strength greatly thwarted the organizers' efforts to ignite fear and hatred. From Synagogues to Broadway productions, Jews across America came together to tell those that would hope to instill fear and misinformation, NOT NOW, NOT HERE. Instead, in some circles, that Saturday (2/25/23) became known as a "Shabbat of Peace". Outside the Broadway show, "Parade" people drew strength and walked right past

Neo-Nazis who were trying to intimidate them. Rather, theater goers recognized the importance of a show about a Southern couple in 1912 in which the husband was a victim of an anti-Semitic trial and later lynched by a mob and how anti-Semitism can permeate society... So, instead of deterring patrons, the haters emboldened the community to stand up to them. Temples all around the country continued their Shabbat Services as a sign of strength, including Temple Chaverim.

Part of what makes Temple Chaverim so special is our connection to the community at large. Temple Chaverim is an influential member of our local Interfaith Clergy Council - a group of spiritual leaders from many religions that foster the ideas of embracing our similarities and respecting our differences. I am inspired by a comment by a pastor at the 5th Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York City regarding supporting Shabbat Services at a neighboring temple on 2/25, "I think there is power and beauty in solidarity; on a strange, awful day like this, we need to be here". If we lay the foundation of a vibrant Jewish community, one in which we set good examples of being a supportive member of our greater community, and educate our children and our neighbors, we build strength and promote the theme of Tikkun Olam— repairing the world.

Cantor's Corner



When I've asked what one's favorite Jewish holiday is, "Passover" is a response that I've gotten a lot from people. Even after many years, it continues to surprise me. Pesach doesn't have the pageantry and frivolity of Purim, nor the presents and fried confectioneries of

Chanukah, so I ask myself, "Why?" Mah nishtanah, ha lilah hazeh? What is different about this night- this holiday?

I believe it has a lot to do with an ingathering of family members to celebrate the Seder and the special time spent together with recurring family traditions. In my own family, we celebrate holidays like Shabbat, Chanukah and Rosh Hashanah more intimately, with just a few family members gathered around our kitchen tablebut on Passover, it's a different story. Every year, we all go to my aunt and uncle's house to celebrate together (barring any pandemics). It may be the one time of the year besides a simcha like a wedding or bat mitzvah, that we will all be in the same room together, and because of that, it takes on even more meaning. The youngest generations act out the story of our Exodus and at some point, we pelt one another with styrofoam hail.

I also wonder if one of the reasons Pesach is such a popular holiday is because it happens at a wonderful time of the year. The days have gotten longer and greener. This is by design; from the Torah we learn that Cantor Mariel Ashkenazy

we "shall keep Chag haMatzot... each spring, for it was then that you left Egypt." Unsurprisingly, Passover is also known as Chag Ha-Aviv, the *Spring Holiday*. The season of spring is all about rebirth; flowers bud through the decaying leaves and grass which give them the nutrients they need to grow forth from the earth and blossom.

The story of Passover— our exodus from Egypt— is a narrative about our origins as Israelites. When the Hebrews escaped, among them were also a mixed multitude of people, an "erev rav." Representing a birth of a nation, the group of Hebrews joined by others, passed through Mitzrayim (Egypt)— from the root tzar— (meaning narrow)— and emerged as a free people. This narrow place was both literal and figurative, representing trials and tribulations, but also the birth canal. The tribe emerges together on the other side connected now as Israelites, having experienced not only God's miracles but saving power. They experience a transition and come out the other side differently. Not only are they free from slavery, but are a changed people. They are reborn.

How will this year's Pesach and spring represent a rebirth for you? It may not be a time for new year's resolutions, but it *is* a time when we can reassess the "chametz" we've collected this year and rid ourselves of it, whether it be spiritually, mentally or physically. We can think of it as spring cleaning from what keeps us in bondage.

May you have a meaningful Passover surrounded by loved ones and delicious food and may you find a way through a narrow place and re-emerge renewed.

A New Approach to Jewish Learning

If you were to come upon one of our 3rd and 4th grade classes on any Sunday morning or any Tuesday or Wednesday afternoon, you will find something remarkable happening. All of our 3rd and 4th grade students are part of Chadash, our new learning experience at Chaverim. They may be building a tower out of cups to experience the story of the Tower of Babel learning how to build it with and without talking to one another. They may be creating their very own covenant with God after the flood, acting as Noah did to reestablish trust with God. Or, they may be envisioning standing on the bimah on the day of their Bar or Bat Mitzvah and how they might feel. Through art, music, science and more our students are exploring what it means to be Jewish in all sorts of new ways. And, through experiential education, our tradition comes alive!











PACT Programs are Back!

As we began our school year, we were thrilled to announce a return to PACT Programs, Parents and Children Together. All of our 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th Graders have an opportunity to explore Judaism with their parents in different ways.

In December, our 3rd and 4th Graders focused on the Jewish heroes of our Torah stories, learning about the incredible things our forefathers and foremothers did. They acted out a dispute between Abraham and Lot and how it was resolved. They explored the action of a patriarch or matriarch that they admired. Additionally, they began to question where our ancestors found God and where we can find God in our lives.

In February, our 6th Graders learned about their families' immigration experience. Through exploring their own family history and traditions, they were able to learn about what it was like for immigrants to come to the United States and begin a new life. Within this program, they were also able to share family recipes and heirlooms. We had an incredible few days of learning.

In March, our 5th Graders will be exploring Jewish Heroes in their own families and beyond. Through the lens of kedushah, or holiness, our families will be examining what it means to be a part of a holy people and to have a relationship with God.



YOUTH PROGRAMMING




